Lions and Rotary clubs are partnering on a joint medical equipment collection drive for Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC), on Saturday morning, August 5, 2023. This service project is to accomplish the collection of donated home medical equipment and/or supplies, which will be refurbished and distributed by FODAC to those in need. Items include hospital beds, wheelchairs, crutches, etc. FODAC refurbishes and then donates the equipment with little or no cost to pre-qualified clients.

## We Serve

We are looking for able-bodied Lions and other adults to load the gear for transportation to a central collection point, but we also need people who can drive to the pick-up locations (even if they can't load items themselves). Volunteers will be assembled into teams.

We will meet at the back patio of the 57th Fighter Group Restaurant, 3829 Clairmont Rd, Atlanta, GA 3034 (next to PDK Airport), at 8:30 AM on Saturday, August 5. We will provide breakfast and drinks for the volunteers and give everyone a few minutes to socialize before heading out to pick up the equipment at about 9 or 9:30 am. Everyone is usually done between 1 and 2. This is a really good hands-on project and is also a great opportunity for fellowship and meeting new people.

**Diabetes** – *We serve to reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve quality of life for those diagnosed.* Since 2000, the prevalence of diabetes has risen more than 300% and affects 31 million people, just in our part of the world, and diabetes is the eighth leading cause of death in the US.

Consider these vision facts: approximately 253 million people are blind or have moderate to severe distance vision impairment (MSVI); and more than 75% of all blindness and MSVI is avoidable.

Childhood Cancer – We serve to support the needs of children and families affected by childhood cancer.

Globally, childhood cancer looks like this: approximately 400,000 children are diagnosed, 9 out of 10 diagnosed children live in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), and less than 30% of those children survive, compared to approximately 80% in high-income countries.

## GEORGIA LIONS The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation



The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation was the dream of a blind man, Atlanta Lions Club member Tom Bingham. In 1949, the Atlanta Lions Club led by Bingham, the Moultrie Lions, and the Albany Lions, each contributed \$1,000, and the Lighthouse was born. Since then, Lions Clubs have served as

the cornerstone of the organization and maintain a vital role in the growth and reach of our mission: to create a better Georgia by bringing individuals into a world of sight.

Did you know?

- Average patient cost exam/glasses = \$25/person vs \$300 for profit
- 52 Georgia counties currently have little or no access to eye care (source: Emory Eye Center)
- 1.4 million Georgians do not have health insurance, and Georgia's uninsured rate of 13.7 percent is the third highest in the US. In rural Georgia, the uninsured rate could climb to more than 25 percent by 2026
- 408,000 low-income Georgians do not qualify for Medicaid in Georgia and make too little to get financial help to buy private insurance at healthcare.gov. These Georgians have incomes below the poverty line (less than \$12,769 a year for an individual or \$21,720 a year for a family of three) and fall into the coverage gap with no affordable health insurance options.

#### **Our State Initiatives** GEORGIA LIONS CAMP – KEEP THE CAMP FIRES BURNING



In 1972, the Okefenokee Lions Club saw a need to provide recreation for the over 12,500 blind children in the state of Georgia. Under the direction and leadership of C.M. Blanton, Past District Governor of Lions District 18-B, it was decided that a one-week summer camp should be held at the Laura S. Walker State Park. In November of 1974, a delegation of Lions met with Governor Jimmy Carter to secure 62 acres of land adjoining the Laura S. Walker State Park. On September 12, 1975, the Georgia Lions' Camp, Inc. was charted as a non-profit organization.

Camp Objectives:

- to foster the desire for participation in all camp activities
- to develop in campers, a sense of responsibility and respect for others.
- to provide the opportunity to develop a more positive attitude toward their disability
- to enable the camper to learn to accept ways of competing and cooperating with others
- to stimulate in campers greater independence, self-reliance, resourcefulness, and initiative
- to help the camper learn new skills and to explore one's individual abilities
- to encourage participation in, and shared responsibilities of a democratic society
- to provide opportunities for understanding and appreciation through an awareness of the natural surroundings
- to aid the camper to achieve self-realization, self-fulfillment and personal identity
- to provide an opportunity for campers to have FUN

## **Bigger than Me: Partnering for a Lasting Legacy**

People come and they go. Their priorities change for one reason or another. They get sick. They get old. They pass away. This is the hard truth of life. Individuals are impermanent.

But partnerships can endure. Partnerships are bigger than one person.

"The cast of characters changes over time," says Nancy Messmer of the Clallam Bay Sekiu Lions in Washington. She and her husband, Lion Roy Morris, continue partnerships they helped create in 2007 with the Washington Clean Coast Alliance, now known as Washington CoastSavers. "You have to keep building the bonds of the alliance to continue," she adds.

The inspiration for CoastSavers began with a Seattle environmentalist who was leading a small group in cleaning up the state's most remote beaches. He came to Messmer and Morris with the news that he was ill. He didn't want sympathy; he just wanted to make sure his work continued.

"Don't let this die," Nancy Messmer remembers him saying.

She and her husband knew that if you're a hard-working person, you can get a lot done just by yourself. "But you can't do the really big things," she adds.

## Better Heart and Sugar Health – Free for your community

The Lions Club of Madison GA is sponsoring an innovative diabetes prevention program. The Better Heart and Sugar Health (BHASH) program has been approved through CDC. The primary goal of BHASH is for all participants to obtain 150 minutes of physical activity each week and lose 5% or more body weight. These simple goals help prevent or delay the onset of diabetes and promote general health.

Any Lions Club Chapter in Georgia can sponsor participants in the BHaSH program. The Madison GA chapter in partnership with Healthy Body Plans delivers the digital sessions at no charge for eligible individuals every month. Sessions with videos, podcasts and electronic guidebooks are forwarded over 12-months. Personal lifestyle coaching sessions are included in the BHaSH program.
