firsthand look on how the dogs are trained.

There is lots of hard work going on all over the state in membership, training, and impactful service projects. Our MD 18 GST Lion Doreen Stallworth, GLT PCC Vicki Hubbard, GMT PDG Len Cutuli, and GMA PDG Willie Cooper are working to support the districts to help increase membership by focusing on rejuvenating the district with new clubs, revitalize clubs with new members, and re-motivating members with new and exciting service. One of our goals this year is to increase our service impact by urging clubs to complete service in five of the LCI Global Causes - Vision, Hunger, Environment, Pediatric Cancer, and Diabetes. Last year MD 18 served over 1,100,000 people. I believe we can do even more and our service is needed now more than ever. Lion Doreen Stallworth will be reaching out to the districts on the importance of conducting service projects and reporting your service. Our goal is to have 65% of our clubs reporting service monthly using MyLion.

Our 2024 State Convention Committee met in August and planning is underway to have a spectacular state convention at the Dubois Porter Center at the Oconee Fall Line Technical College in Dublin, Georgia April 26-28, 2024. I hope everyone will make plans to attend. Be sure to sign up before the next price increase on September 30th.

With your support, MD18 will experience countless new achievements this year. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you. I look forward to meeting all of the Lions and Leos in our state! Remember, we are "Changing the World".

Lions Clubs to earn state awards at the 2024 MD18 Annual Convention. These awards offer a chance for clubs to be recognized for their service. First and second-place awards are given to the clubs recording, on the Lions International website (MyLion), the most service hours in each of our five global initiates: Diabetes, Vision, Hunger, Environment, and Childhood Cancer. The Committee will use the service hours logged in MyLion between July 1, 2023, and April 15, 2024. Get your club members' service hours logged!

Does your club prepare a physical or digital scrapbook documenting the club's activities for the year? If not, you should! It provides a historical record of what your club did during the year and you can win an award for best physical scrapbook or best digital scrapbook!

We want our communities to know how we serve their needs. The State Awards Committee will also give awards to clubs that make the best use of social media like Facebook, YouTube, X, Instagram, etc. To be entered, notify the First Vice-District Governor in your district that you want your social media site to be monitored.

### Our Childhood Cancer Cause



#### Report from Lion PDG Philip Smith, MD18 Pediatric Cancer Chairperson:

This year's Council of Governors has continued our Childhood Cancer State/District project "The Joshua Block Party." The project officially starts in January and will conclude at the 2024 State convention. We encourage all clubs to start collecting Legos now. Please bring the Legos to District/MD meetings and they will be channeled back to District 18N through the District Governors.

In addition, I encourage all clubs to partner with local chapters of community awareness groups to raise money and serve families dealing with childhood cancer. There is a group in Coffee County that helps families with the burdens of travel, lodging, meals, etc. while also supporting them emotionally. The Douglas Lions Club has members in the group. LEO Club members are also helping. Please remember to report the service hours (in MyLion) of members and family members who volunteer with these awareness groups.

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, so I encourage clubs to join others in honoring children and survivors affected by this disease and in raising awareness. Use golden ribbons to raise awareness and show support by putting them on your doors at work, home, church, etc.

### Some simple facts to share about childhood cancer:

- 43 children in the U.S. are diagnosed with cancer every day
- Worldwide, about 400,000 children and adolescents are diagnosed with cancer each year
- 9 in 10 children with cancer live in low and middle-income countries
- Less than 30% of children who live in low and middle-income countries survive
- Greater than 80% of children who live in high-income countries survive

**LCIF has partnered with Global HOPE** to help address the huge discrepancies in outcomes from childhood cancer in developing countries compared to developed countries. Last Lions year, LCIF awarded 13 childhood cancer-related grants totaling \$624,926. 

### **Know Your Club Constitution**

From the Global Lions Forum Facebook Page – How does your club handle funds? The Standard Club Constitution ARTICLE XI, Club Funds clearly states:



#### Section 1. PUBLIC (ACTIVITY) FUNDS

All funds raised from the public must be returned to public use, including money accumulated from invested public funds. The only deductions that may be made from the activity account are the direct operating expenses of the fundraising activity. Money accumulated from interest must also be returned to public use.

### Section 2. ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDS.

Administrative funds are supported through contributions from members through dues, fines and other individual contributions.

### LCIF - Our Foundation

Greetings Lions,

For those who are new or may need a refresher, LCIF is the grant-making body empowering Lions to create greater impact in their communities and around the world. The vast majority of funding LCIF receives is from Lions; one hundred percent of every donation supports Lions service through LCIF grants and programs.



Fortunately, disaster relief is just one area supported by LCIF because there have been so many natural disasters recently! At the writing, preparations are underway for another hurricane. In the short span of July 2023 to August 2023, LCIF has awarded 34 disaster relief-related grants totaling \$387,151!

As Lions, when considering how to help after a disaster, LCIF should be at the top of the list. LCIF grants funds before, during, and after a disaster by way of Disaster Preparedness Grants, Emergency Grants, Community Recovery Grants, and Major Catastrophe Grants.   "Service brings Membership." All non-Lion volunteers at your service projects are prospective Lions. This
  practice can increase our service and volunteer hours. You may not know that Lions International's 16
  partner organizations, that provide LCIF with funding, base their donations on our reported volunteer
  hours. (This is a good talking point.)

**LCI introduced three new initiatives** at the International Convention in Boston. In addition to our current five global causes, Vision, Diabetes, Hunger, Childhood Cancer, and Environment, LCI has added Youth, Disaster Relief, and Humanitarian Efforts. Currently, MyLion does not require reporting for the latter three.

**The reported Service Activities**, in our four Districts, for our first month, identified 6 Causes – Vision, Diabetes, Hunger, Environment, Youth, and Other – and the reported activities included eye screenings, eyeglasses, food packing programs, Strides Walks, Eyeglass Readers for Vets, feeding 115 band students, planting flowers at an elementary school. The category "Other" included summer reading **Continued...** 



**(GAT Continued from previous page)** programs, pancake breakfast fundraisers, Christmas gifts for children, library work, hygiene kits, art donations, and more. <u>Please let your District GST and District Initiative Chairs know about your service projects so they can be shared with clubs throughout Georgia. We hope to learn from each other!</u>

**International President Patti Hill** has chosen the Environment Cause as part of her platform. So, along with your community's other needs, think Environment!

**The Lions Portal** that will take the place of MyLion and MyLCI is targeted to launch in late September 2023. **MISSION 1.5** was introduced at LCICon in Boston. It is LCI's effort to increase membership to 1.5 million by June of 2027 through the Global Membership Approach (GMA). This means adding new members and new clubs, as well as looking at club retention. Council Chair Mark Anners says, "All hands on deck – we accept the challenge!"

#### A brief on our other Global Action Team Members:

### MD18 Global Leadership Team (GLT) Report

We have just started the Lions year off and all the District GLT Coordinators have hit the ground running with ambitious goals for the year.

The District GLTs are as follows:

- Lion Fran Schefer District L
- PCC Marlene Humphry District O
- PDG Steve Williams District I
- Lion Rushe Hudzinski District N

We had our first GLT zoom call July 24, 2023. Because two of our District GLTs are new to their positions they had a lot of questions. The two other seasoned GLTs were glad to share their experiences.

The shared topic of all was TRAINING!!! Districts will do training for club officers, Guiding Lions, and Zone Chairs. LCI grants at the District Level and MD level should be pursued. New leaders are needed and they must be trained correctly. I asked the GLTs to get with their District Governors and let them share their goals for the year.

**District L:** One of District L GLT's goals is to have several training opportunities by the end of the first quarter of the 2023-2024 Lion year. The district will hold training for club officers and zone chairpersons. 100% of zone chairpersons are expected to attend zone chairperson training. District L will expect 50% of club officers (president, secretary, and treasurer) to attend club officer training.

**District I:** Following their District neighbors, District I GLT PDG Steve Williams and DG Chris Sullivan are discussing training opportunities. By the end of the first quarter of the 2023-24 Lions year, District I will hold training for club officers and zone chairpersons. The District GLT coordinator will report each training using the "manage training" feature in Learn on the LCI website.

Their team expects 100% of zone chairpersons to attend zone chairperson training and they expect 50% of club officers (president, secretary, and treasurer) to attend club officer training.

**District O:** The District, led by DG Shannon Kingston, increased its goal numbers. District O GLT PCC Marlene Humphrey and DG Shannon, are looking at the following goals:

- Training for club officers and zone chairs by the end of the first quarter of the 2023-24 Lions year.
- Reporting training using the manage training feature in Learn.
- Having 75% of zone chairpersons attend training, and having 75% of club officers (president, secretary, and treasurer) attend club officer training.

At their 1st Cabinet meeting on Saturday, August 5, 2023, they offered training for Certified Guiding Lions. Eleven Lions took part in the training session and six Lions took the test to become a Certified Guiding Lion.

**District N:** District N stated that by the end of the first quarter of the 2023-24 Lions year, their district will hold training for club officers and zone chairpersons. The District GLT Coordinator Lion Rushe Hudzinski will report each training using the manage training feature in Learn. Their team reports that 100% of zone chairpersons attended training by June 30, 2023. They expect 60% of club officers (president, secretary, and treasurer) to attend club officer training.

### Opportunities to build better Lions Leaders:

Look out for LCI-sponsored trainings, such as ELLI (Emerging Lions Leadership Institute), RELLI (Regional Emerging Lions Leadership Institute), and ALLI (Advanced Lions Leadership Institute). MD18 will also offer the Grace Clower Lions Leadership Retreat, a great opportunity for in-person training. Watch for more info.

**MD18 Lions Alert Report** – Providing Emergency Response and Assistance 2023-2024 For decades, Lions have provided humanitarian assistance to people affected by disasters. Lions remain dedicated to serving their communities, especially in times of crisis. The mission of the Lions ALERT program is "to provide Lions with a standardized structure and network to deliver needed services to people in emergency situations."

The absence of information about disaster preparedness in Lions Clubs in MD 18 constitutes a critical gap in our understanding of one's community major incidents or disasters readiness. Establishing relationships and building partnerships involves establishing formal preparedness and response agreements with partners in each multiple district.

The MD18 Alert manual will follow Lions International's 13 step guideline plan on contact procedures and identifying individuals who will need information and assistance during an emergency. By establishing relationships between State, Local, national disaster response center officials, private companies, and other partners ahead of time organizational needs will be identified, creating a better picture of requirements for an effective and efficient response.

This manual will provide specific and detailed guidance concerning procedures to respond to a disaster or major incident. The manual will ensure that we as Lions Clubs will be in a state of readiness.

Another constricting factor regarding disaster planning is linked to disaster knowledge. This means that the lack of knowledge influences the limited attention disaster planning receives. The understanding factor behind the lack of disaster knowledge and disaster training may be because there exists the common idea that any disaster management is the sole responsibility of local municipalities or disaster centers.

The MD 18 Council of Governors will make available an approved disaster manual for Lions of Georgia as a guide to assist districts and clubs with disaster relief.

### Our Vision Cause – Working with Schools

Message from 2nd Vice District Governor Dr.Angela Williams:

Gwinnett County Public Schools and Dekalb County School District superintendents signed a vision screening partnership agreement with District 18-I Lions Clubs to provide vision screenings in schools to students in K-12 grades. Digital screeners are used to scan students' pupils and give a reading within 30-45 seconds. It is non-invasive and enables us to screen many children quickly and efficiently. The screeners are about the size of a camera and can accurately detect potential common conditions found in children:

- Myopia (nearsightedness)
- Hyperopia (farsightedness)
- Astigmatism (blurred vision)
- Anisometropia (unequal refractive power)
- Strabismus (eye misalignment)
- Anisocoria (unequal pupil size)
- Gaze

A vision screening does not replace an eye exam. If a vision risk factor is indicated, we recommend an eye exam be provided by a licensed eye care professional. Following a screening, the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation can offer eye exams, glasses, and surgical services.

#### 2023-2024 Multiple-District 18

#### **Outstanding State Awards Program**

The MD18 Council of Governors State Award Committee is happy to announce the criteria for all awards granted during the 2023-2024 term. Please make the responsible parties in your club aware of the following qualification criteria and encourage them to apply for a COG State Award.

- 1. Service Hours may be turned in for service projects in the following LCI categories:
  - a. Diabetes
  - b. Vision
  - c. Hunger
  - d. The Environment
  - e. Childhood Cancer
- It is not necessary to submit a club's service hours to the State Awards Committee. The Committee will use the service hours posted to MyLion for service projects conducted between July 1, 2023, and April 15, 2024.
- Service hours for a club will be divided by the number of club members to allow for all clubs to be treated equally based on relative service per member. There will be a winner and a runner up for each category.
- 4. The fact that we will be relying upon your posting your service hours to MyLion means it is very important for your club to correctly and promptly enter all service projects and the hours associated with those hours into MyLion. Club Secretaries as well as the new Global Service Chair may enter your service project hours.
- The winning club will be allowed to decide whether they would like for their financial reward to go to the Georgia Lions Camp, Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Leader Dogs/SE Guide Dogs, Learning Ally, and LCIF.

#### Scrapbook Awards

Scrapbooks can provide a wonderful history of the activities of a Lions Club. It can afford members of tomorrow to see what members in the past did to serve their communities. It can also provide a rich history of the members and their role in supporting their Lions Club. The State Awards Committee encourages all Lions Clubs to put together a scrapbook documenting this Lions' year.

There are awards given for both electronic and physical scrapbooks. It is up to the creator's imagination as to what events will be shown and how it will be presented; however, at a minimum, the scrapbook should present a written and pictorial history about Club events during the fiscal year being judged. Examples of content are photos, programs, and news clippings from installations, inductions, special presentations, service projects, fundraising events, and visits to district meetings or multi-district meetings.

- A single scrapbook may only be presented in one of the two formats: digital or bound.
- Scrapbooks must bear the Club's name on the opening slide for digital format or on the opening page for a bound format.
- A USB Flash Drive is the preferred format for submitting digital scrapbooks to the State Awards Committee. The USB Flash Drive must be submitted on the first day of the 2024 Multi-District Convention. The size of the scrapbook is limited to 1GB.
- The digital scrapbook entry may be submitted in one of the following formats: PowerPoint, a
  website dedicated to the scrapbook, a digital scrapbook program such as Smile box, Shutterfly,
  etc.
- Scrapbooks will be judged on how well their presentation reflects what the club is doing. Be sure to date and label the scrapbook entries. It is suggested that the club include pictures and captions that tell a story about the club. Include personal touches to tell the club story. Use your imagination.
- Consideration will be given for content, organization, originality, creativity, and neatness.

#### Social Media Awards

Social media is such a vital communication tool today. It is one of the most important ways of reaching new prospective Lions. To further this goal, we have added an award category for the club with the best use of social media for the purpose of communicating and promoting Lionism to grow their club, their District, and Lions in general, and to show their community how they serve.

Here are the guidelines for submission followed by the judging criteria:

Vision Examination for your school. The following information is designed to
provide you with basic information to explain the difference between a vision
screening and eye exam/mobile vision clinic. Also, you will understand the
process and needs for the Vision Screening Day at your school.

#### VISION SCREENING:

A digital screener is utilized to scan participants' pupils and give a reading within 30-45 seconds. It is non-invasive and enables us to screen many children quickly and efficiently. Our digital screeners are about the size of a camera and accurately detect the potential for these common conditions found in children:

- Myopia (nearsightedness)
- Hyperopia (farsightedness)
- Astigmatism (blurred vision)
- Anisometropia (unequal refractive power)
- Strabismus (eye misalignment)
- Anisocoria (unequal pupil size)
- Gaze

A vision screening will need only a small area or room where the ambient lighting can be adjusted. Usually, any classroom is acceptable. We have learned that it is best to start at 8:30 a.m. and go up until noon, if necessary, but we are flexible to your needs. With good organization and planning, we can screen between 300-400 students within four hours.

### EYE EXAM/MOBILE CLINIC:

A vision screening does not replace an eye exam. If a vision risk factor is indicated, we recommend an eye exam be provided by a licensed eye care professional. Following a vision screening, The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation can offer eye exams, glasses, and surgical services. If indicated, we can discuss with you the possibility of a mobile vision clinic visiting your school.
